Page 8: Back Features

Page 9: Left Side Features

NOTES As a precaution, the Power button is automatically disabled when you remove the battery cover. You can only turn on the power when the battery cover is installed to the unit. The battery cover is removable, and allows you to remove or replace the main battery.

Page 10: Bottom Features

NOTE To shutdown the device, press the Power button for about four seconds then tap Yes. All open files will be unsaved. Bottom features Stylus Infrared (IR) Port Reset switch - allows you to perform a soft reset in case the device •...

Page 11: Installing And Removing The Battery

The GPS car kit (MyPal A686/A696 only) The GPS car kit includes: Car holder - holds the Pocket PC. • Gooseneck - securely attaches the Pocket PC to the car's windshield. • Installing and removing the battery NOTE Opening the battery cover automatically turns off the power. There is a mechanism at the upper left side of the battery compartment that switches the power off automatically when you slide out the battery cover.

Page 12: Setting Up Gps

AC adapter/ Power cable NOTE The battery can not be charged via old typed PC or notebooks with 100mAh USB charging. As soon as the power cable is connected to a power source, the battery will start charging and the power LED will show a steady red light.

Menu bar At the bottom of the screen of a program is the Menu bar. You can use the menus and buttons on the Menu bar to perform commands and actions.

Page 17: Chapter 2 Basics

Chapter 2 Basics Viewing system information Your device allows you to easily display the built-in specifications. NOTE You cannot change the information you see in the system information screens. To display the system information: > Settings > System tab > System Information icon

Page 18: To Type With The Soft Keyboard

To type with the soft keyboard: > Keyboard. 1. Tap 2. Tap the keys on the on-screen keyboard with the stylus to enter information. Word completion feature When you use the Input Panel and the soft keyboard, your device anticipates the word you are typing and displays it above the Input Panel. When you tap the displayed word, it is inserted into your text at the insertion point.

Page 19: To Use Block Recognizer

To use Block Recognizer: With the Block Recognizer, you can input character strokes that are similar to those used on other devices. > Block Recognizer. 1. Tap 2. Write a letter within the writing area. When you write a letter, it is converted to a typed text that appears on the screen.

Page 20: Writing On The Screen

Writing on the screen In any program that accepts writing, such as the Notes program, and in the Notes tab in Calendar, Contacts, and Tasks, you can use the stylus to write directly on the screen. Write the way you do on paper. You can edit and format what you have written and convert the writing to text at a later time.

<u>Page 21</u> If the conversion is incorrect, you can select different words from a list of alternates or return to the original writing. 1. Tap and hold the incorrect word. 2. When the pop-up menu appears, tap Alternates to display a list of alternate words for the selection.

Page 22: Drawing On The Screen

Drawing on the screen You can draw on the screen in the same way that you write on the screen. The difference between writing and drawing on the screen is how you select items and how they can be edited. For example, selected drawings can be resized, while writing cannot.

Page 23: Recording A Message

Recording a message In any program where you can write or draw on the screen, you can also quickly capture thoughts, reminders, and phone numbers by recording a message. In Calendar, Tasks, and Contacts, you can include a recording in the Notes tab. In the Notes program, you can either create a standalone recording or include a recording in a written note.

Page 24: Finding And Organizing Information

To change the recording format: 1. In the note list, tap Menu > Options > Global Input Options link > Options tab. 2. Select your desired recording format from the Voice recording format pull-down menu then tap ok when done. NOTE Compared to other settings, the Pulse Code

Modulation (PCM) provides slightly better sound quality but takes up 50...

Page 25: Customizing Your Device

Customizing your device You can customize your device by adjusting the settings, using the built-in programs, and installing additional software. To see the available options: > Settings > Personal or System tab. • NOTE Tap and hold the slider on the right side of the screen to display other Settings icons.

Page 26: Setting A Password

Changing the start menu To change the menu items: > Settings > Menus icon. 1. Tap 2. Check the box opposite the items that you wish to appear on the Start Menu. 3. Tap ok. NOTE Items that are not added in the Start menu can be found in the Programs.

Page 27: Changing The Screen Display Orientation

3. Select the password type, Simple 4 digit or Strong alphanumeric. 4. Key-in a password. If you selected the Strong alphanumeric type of password, you need to key-in the password twice. 5. Tap the Hint tab to create a kind of reminder in case you forget your password.

Page 28: Changing The Screen Theme

To enable the ClearType feature: > Settings > System tab > Screen icon > Clear Type tab. 1. Tap 2. Check the Enable Clear Type box, then tap ok. To change the screen text size: > Settings > System tab > Screen icon > Text Size tab. 1.

<u>Page 29</u> To customize the button settlings: 1. Tap the Up/Down Control tab. 2. Tap the slider to your desired settings of Up/Down button reaction time. 3. Tap the Advance tab to set options for the key light and hold switch. 4. Tap ok when done. Using Mode Switcher and Task Switcher On the rightmost group of buttons on the device (see Chapter 1), its right button functions, by default, as the Mode Switcher button which...

Page 30: Setting The Backlight

Setting the backlight To set the backlight: > Settings > System tab > Backlight icon. 1. Tap 2. Adjust the display brightness by dragging the slider towards Dark or Bright until you achieve your desired screen brightness. 3. Tap the Advance tab and customize the backlight settings when using battery power and AC power.

Page 31: Selecting Sounds And Notifications

Selecting sounds and notifications Your device can remind you of things you have to do in several ways. For example, if you have set up an appointment in Calendar, a task with a due date, or an alarm in Clock, you will be notified in any of the following ways. •...

<u>Page 32</u> Changing the wakeup settings > Personal tab > Wakeup Source icon. 1. Tap 2. Check the boxes of the items to control what functions/conditions will turn on the device's power. Pressing any one of the function buttons on the front panel wakes up the device.

Page 33: Using Simple Applications

Changing the memory settings To display the memory allocation: > Settings > System tab > Memory icon. 1. Tap 2. Tap ok when done. To check the storage card memory: > Settings > System tab > Memory icon > Storage Card tab 1.

Page 34: Bubble Breaker

Calculator Tap the Calculator icon to use basic calculator functions. Games Tap the Games icon to display the available games. Bubble Breaker The main objective of this game is to burst all the bubbles. To do so, tap two or more bubbles of the same color that are connected to each other. The more bubbles you burst at a time, the higher your score.

<u>Page 35</u> 4. Tap Menu > Set as Today Background... to use the picture as your wallpaper in the Today screen. Page 36: Checking Device Status

Chapter 3 Synchronize and Enhance Microsoft ActiveSync ® The Microsoft ActiveSync ® MyPal. With ActiveSync, you can synchronize the information on your desktop computer with the information on your device. Synchronization compares the data on your device with your desktop computer and updates both computers with the most recent information.

<u>Page 38</u> Installing ActiveSync The ActiveSync program is already installed on your device. To synchronize information on your device with your computer, you must also install ActiveSync on your computer. Install ActiveSync from the Companion CD that came with your product package. NOTE Before starting the ActiveSync installation, make sure that you have Microsoft...

Page 39: Synchronizing Your Device

Synchronizing your device Connecting your device to a computer 1. Connect the mini USB device plug of the sync cable to the mini USB connector at the left side of your device. 2. Connect the other end of the sync cable to a USB port on your computer.

Page 40 2. Check the box if you want to synchronize directly with a server. Ask your network administrator for the server address and logon credentials. Using the summary screen When you tap an appointment in Calendar, a summary screen appears. To change the appointment, tap Edit. Tap to change details of the appointment Creating meeting requests You can set up meetings with users of Outlook and Pocket Outlook. The meeting request will be created automatically and sent either when you synchronize Inbox or when you connect to your e-mail server.

Page 46: Contacts

Contacts Contacts maintains a list of your friends and colleagues so that you can easily find the information you look for, whether you are at home or on the road. Using the Bluetooth or the infrared port (IR) on the device, you can quickly share Contacts information with other device

Page 48: Finding A Contact

Page 52: Messaging

Messaging Use Messaging to send and receive e-mail messages in one of these ways: • Synchronize e-mail messages with Microsoft Exchange or Microsoft Outlook on your desktop computer • Send and receive e-mail messages by connecting directly to an e-mail server through an Internet service provider (ISP) or a network Synchronizing e-mail messages You can e-mail messages as part of the general synchronization process.

<u>Page 53</u> and messages that have been deleted on the e-mail server are removed from the device Inbox folder. Messages that you receive directly from an e-mail server are linked to your e-mail server rather than your desktop computer. When you delete a message on your device, it is also deleted from the e-mail server the next time you connect, based on the settings you selected in ActiveSync.

Page 54: Reading Messages In Inbox

Reading messages in Inbox The messages you receive appear in your Inbox folder. By default, the most recently received messages appear on top of the list. Unread messages appear in boldface. Tap to select email account, and the folder that you wish to display Tap an e-mail message from your Inbox to display it.

Page 55: Composing Messages

Composing messages To compose a message: 1. Tap New to display a blank e-mail screen. Enter the e-mail address here Tap to send the message 2. In the To field, enter the e-mail address of your recipient. You may either type the e-mail address or select a name from the Contacts list by tapping "To".

<u>Page 56</u> NOTE To enter preset or frequently used messages, tap Menu > My Text and select your desired message. To create or edit a preset message before adding it to the message body, tap Menu > My Text > Edit My Text Messages, select a message to change or select a blank line at the bottom of the list, then enter your text and tap ok.

Page 57: Chapter 5 Companion Programs

The companion programs consist of Microsoft Excel Mobile, Microsoft ® Media™ Player, ASUS Hands-Free, and Remote Presenter for Pocket PC. To switch to a companion program on your

device, tap Programs on the menu, then tap the program that you wish to open.

Page 58 Tap to show or hide the input panel Saving Word Mobile documents To save a Word Mobile document: When you have finished editing your document, tap ok. By default, the document is saved using the first line as the file name. For example, if your first line in the document has the words Things to do, these words appear as the file name in your Word documents list.

<u>Page 59</u> Opening an existing Word Mobile document Word Mobile contains a list of the files stored on your device. Tap a file in the list to open. To delete, make copies of, and send files, tap and hold a file in the list, then select the appropriate action on the pop-up menu. Page 60: Excel Mobile

Excel Mobile Excel Mobile provides fundamental spreadsheet tools, such as formulas, functions, sorting, and filtering. To display the toolbar, tap View > Toolbar. Tap to access view options NOTE You can open only one Excel Mobile document at a time; when you open a second document, you will be asked to save the first.

Page 61: Tips For Working In Excel Mobile

Saving an Excel Mobile document To save an Excel Mobile document: When you have finished editing your document, tap ok. By default, your document is saved as Book1 as the file name. You can change the file name to one that is more descriptive of your document. See the procedure below for saving options.

Page 62: Powerpoint Mobile

Show and hide window elements. Tap View > Show. • Freeze and unfreeze panes on a worksheet. First select the cell • where you want to freeze panes. Tap View > Freeze Panes. You might want to freeze the top and leftmost panes in a worksheet to keep the row and column labels visible as you scroll through a sheet.

Page 63: Setting Show Options

Viewing a PowerPoint Mobile file To go to the previous or next slide: 1. While viewing a PowerPoint file, tap the arrow on the lower-left side of the screen to open the menu. 2. In the menu, tap Next or Previous to go forward or go back in your PowerPoint Mobile file.

Using dialing rules Additional numbers may need to be dialed depending on your given location when connecting. For example, if you want to dial from work, a 9 prefix must often be dialed, or an area code is needed. To avoid creating a new modem connection for each situation, set dialing rules for the locations from which you often connect to.

Page 83: Infrared (Ir) Connection

3. To run a program from the computer that are specifically sized for use with your Pocket PC, you can select the Limit size of server desktop to fit on this screen option to better fit the program on the device screen. 4.

Receiving infrared beams To receive a file via infrared beam: 1. When another infrared device within range beams file or data to you, your device receives the file or data and prompts a receiving data status. 2. After data transmission, tap Yes to accept or No to reject.

Page 85: Chapter 8 Bluetooth

Chapter 8 Bluetooth Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology. Devices with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information without requiring a physical connection. Unlike infrared, you do not need to line up devices to exchange information through Bluetooth. The devices only need to be within a range of about 10 meters (30 feet) in an open space environment.

Page 86: Bluetooth Settings

Bluetooth settings To configure Bluetooth settings: > Bluetooth Settings. 1. Tap 2. Tap one of the tabs at the bottom of the Settings screen to access and modify various settings. Accessibility Allows you to: • Specify a name that identifies your Pocket PC as a Bluetooth device.

Page 87: Bluetooth Manager

Serial Port - indicates the serial • port address assignments. Tap Advanced to check the current serial port addresses. These cannot be changed. See the section "Remote device services" for details. Personal Network Server - allows • hosting of a Bluetooth-based personal area network.

Page 88: Connection Wizard

To launch the Bluetooth Connection Wizard: 1. Tap New from the Bluetooth Manager Menu bar. The Bluetooth Connection Wizard screen appears. 2. Select a type of connection that you want to set up. Tap Next. 3. Follow the on-screen instructions to set up the connection.

Page 89: Remote Device Services
