Page 23 Basic Skills Connecting to a Desktop Computer Before connecting your Pocket PC to a desktop computer, check the follows. ActiveSync has been installed on your desktop. (See Chapter 3.) Make sure that the Pocket PC and the desktop computer are both turned off.

<u>Page 24</u> Basic Skills To connect using a separately sold serial cradle: Connect the serial cradle to the serial port of the desktop computer. Connect the Pocket PC to the serial cradle. To connect directly using a connection cable: Connect the Pocket PC directly to your desktop computer using a USB cable (sold separately).

#### Page 25: Today Screen

Basic Skills Today Screen When you turn on your Pocket PC for the first time each day (or after 4 hours of inactivity), you'll see the Today screen. You can also display it by tapping and then Today. On the Today screen, you can see at a glance important information for the day.

# Page 28: Navigation Bar And Command Bar

Basic Skills Navigation Bar and Command Bar The navigation bar is located at the top of the screen. It displays the active program and current time, and allows you to switch to programs and close screens. Use the command bar at the bottom of the screen to perform tasks in the open program.

## Page 29: Pop-Up Menus

Basic Skills Pop-up Menus With pop-up menus, you can quickly choose an action for an item. For example, you can use the pop-up menu in the contact list to quickly delete a contact, make a copy of a contact, or send an e-mail message to a contact.

#### Page 30: Enter Information On Your Pocket Pc

Basic Skills Enter Information on Your Pocket PC You have several options for entering new information: Use the input panel to enter typed text by using the soft keyboard or other input method. Write directly on the screen. Draw pictures on the screen. Speak into your Pocket PC microphone to record a message.

<u>Page 31</u> Basic Skills When you use the input panel, your Pocket PC anticipates the word you are typing or writing and displays it above the input panel. When you tap the displayed word, it is inserted into your text at the insertion point. The more you use your Pocket PC, the more words it learns to anticipate.

# Page 32: Writing On The Screen

Basic Skills To use Block Recognizer: With Block Recognizer you can input character strokes using the stylus that are similar to those used on other devices. Tap the arrow next to the Input Panel button and then Block Recognizer. Write a letter in the box. When you write a letter, it is converted to typed text that appears on the screen.

<u>Page 33</u> Basic Skills To write on the screen: Tap the Pen button to switch to writing mode. This action displays lines on the screen to help you write. Tap the Pen button and use your stylus like a pen. Some programs that accept writing may not have the Pen button. See the documentation for that program to find out how to switch to writing mode.

<u>Page 34</u> Basic Skills To convert writing to text: Tap Tools and then Recognize. If you want to convert only certain words, select them before tapping Recognize on the Tools menu (or tap and hold the selected words and then tap Recognize on the pop-up menu). If a word is not recognized, it is left as writing.

<u>Page 35</u> Basic Skills If the conversion is incorrect, you can select different words from a list of alternates or return to the original writing. To do so, tap and hold the incorrect word (tap one word at a time). On the pop-up menu, tap Alternates.

#### Page 36: Drawing On The Screen

Basic Skills Drawing on the Screen You can draw on the screen in the same way that you write on the screen. The difference between writing and drawing on the screen is how you select items and how they can be edited. For example, selected drawings can be resized, while writing cannot.

#### Page 37: Recording A Message

Basic Skills Recording a Message In any program where you can write or draw on the screen, you can also quickly capture thoughts, reminders, and phone numbers by recording a message. In Calendar, Tasks, and Contacts, you can include a recording in the Notes tab.

# Page 38: Using My Text

Basic Skills Using My Text When using Inbox or MSN Messenger, use My Text to quickly insert preset or frequently used messages into the text entry area. To insert a message, tap My Text and tap a message. Tap to select a prewritten message. You can add text after inserting a My Text message before sending it.

#### Page 39: Find And Organize Information

Basic Skills Find and Organize Information The Find feature on your Pocket PC helps you quickly locate information. On the menu, tap Find. Enter the text you want to find, select a data type, and then tap Go to start the search. To quickly find information that is taking up storage space on your Pocket PC, select Larger than 64 KB in Type.

#### Page 40: Customize Your Pocket Pc

Adjusting Settings You can adjust device settings to suit your preferences. To see available options, tap, Settings, then the Personal or System tab located at the bottom of the screen.

Connect your Pocket PC and desktop computer. Double-click the \*.exe file. If the file is an installer, the installation wizard will begin. Follow the directions on the screen.

Page 42 Basic Skills To add a program to the Start menu: , Settings, Menus, the Start Menu tab, and then the check box for the program. If you do not see the program listed, you can either use File Explorer on the Pocket PC to move the program to the Start Menu folder or use ActiveSync on the desktop computer to create a shortcut to the program and place the shortcut in the Start Menu folder.

<u>Page 43</u> Basic Skills To Set Front Light You can set the screen brightness for better sight according to a place of use. You can also set the time that elapses until the front light turns off automatically after the last operation. and then Settings.

<u>Page 44</u> Basic Skills Setting Power You can set to confirm the built-in battery remaining power and the time that elapses until the power turns off after the last operation. and then Settings. On the System tab, tap Power. Set the Power. Displays the built-in battery remaining power.

Page 45 Basic Skills To confirm usage status of a storage card: Tap Storage card tab on the Memory setting screen. Capacity of a storage card being inserted. Free space. Capacity in use. When finished, tap OK to return to the System tab screen. If storage cards are inserted both in the CF card slot and the SD card slot, the usage status is displayed only for one (basically, the firstly inserted one) of these cards.
